### Please Note

Notebooks #1 through # 215b are in chronological order.

Notebooks #216 through #221 are the notebooks used by David Wagoner for Straw for the Fire.

Notebooks #222 through #259 are undated.

Notebooks #260 through #277 (with the exception of #267) are undated notebooks from Saginaw.

Notebook #267 has been identified by David Wagoner as 1948 and has been placed in chronological sequence after notebook #99.

The majority of the notebooks in the Roethke Collection have been dated; however, the date that appears in each book is usually not the date of the original entries. Rather, the date refers to the day(s) on which he reviewed the work previously done. The notebooks have been filed according to the date of the review, partly because the changes made would be more significant to the researcher than the original entries. Where several dates are available, the notebook has been filed by the most recent date. Earlier dates have been included in parentheses. Dates appearing in brackets indicate that the date is either not immediately apparent to the researcher or that the date has been estimated through the use of internal evidence.

The few notebooks that came to the collection from Saginaw have been marked with an S after the date and interfiled with the rest of the notebooks. The undated notebooks have been left separated - those from Washington and those from Saginaw.

All the notebooks are autograph. Almost all are spiral notebooks. Almost all are filled.
