Friends of the Libraries 2007 Awards to Support Research, Services, and Preservation

The Friends of the Libraries announces this year's awards for special Libraries projects and materials. The Board of the Friends of the Libraries reviewed applications and granted over \$35,000 for special projects which are not funded through regular Libraries budgets. Your gift to the Friends of the Libraries supports these vital initiatives.

Architecture Archives Processing Project • Special Collections

Fund cleaning, repair, and housing of the drawings in the Architecture Archive, approximately 1000 drawings created by students in the UW Department of Architecture program from 1914-1949.

Robert Hitchman Pacific Northwest Library Project • Special Collections

Process the Hitchman Pacific Northwest Library, a gift in 2006 from the widow of the distinguished Northwest historian, bibliographer, and antiquarian, Robert Hitchman, to be fully accessible in the Libraries online catalog.

Banned Books and Award Books • Children's and Young Adult Literature Collection

Purchase books for the Children's and Young Adult Literature Collection that have been challenged, restricted, or banned in the past 10 years and that have won important national or international recognition through awards or "best books" lists.

Archival Access Project • Special Collections

Create 3500 additional EAD (Encoded Archival Description) finding aids containing previously inaccessible information about unique archival and manuscript holdings in Special Collections. These finding aids will be available to researchers via the Web.

Contemporary Africa through Graphic Novels •

American Ethnic and African Studies

Build a core African graphic novel collection at UW Seattle and Bothell to enrich the African Studies holdings and support the growing interest in African studies across the three campuses.

AYPE Photograph Collection Project • Special Collections

Create access to collections of personal family photography and postcards of the 1909 Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition (AYPE), which was held on the UW campus.

Audio support for Libraries Events • Libraries Facilities
Purchase a new portable sound system for Libraries events.

Wireless Librarian • Engineering Library
Purchase signage and display to market online reference station and services for Engineering Library patrons.

Black Panthers Photographic Exhibition • Odegaard Undergraduate Library
Bring the Aperture Foundation exhibition "The Black Panthers: Making Sense of History" photographs by Stephen Shames to Odegaard Undergraduate Library in Spring of 2008.

Puget Sounds: Documenting Music Cultures Close to Home • Media Center
Document the range of music in the Puget Sound region between July 2007 and June 2008 by purchasing commercially available music from record labels and artists in this area -- from independent labels as well as recent immigrant communities.

BioToolBar • Health Sciences Library
Develop a browser-based toolbar that will simplify granting access to University of Washington Health Sciences Library (UW HSL) restricted resources, such as scientific journals and bioinformatics software.

Letter from the Friends President



Dear Friends,

Forty-four years ago, in September 1963, I entered the University of Washington as a freshman. I had graduated from high school in Walla Walla and worked that summer driving a truck in wheat and pea harvests and working in a cannery. My last job was loading fifty-pound bags of onions on a rail box car. I then took the Greyhound bus to Seattle and made my way to Terry Hall at the UW.

One of the first things I did was see Federico Fellini's movie, *8 1/2* at the Varsity Theater on The Ave. Talk about culture shock. From the farms of Eastern Washington to the big city and an avant-garde Italian film.

I remember so clearly the beauty and size of the UW campus. I was particularly struck by Suzzallo Library. If you have never been in the building, please come and see it. The reading room, measuring 65 feet high, 52 feet wide and 250 feet long, has been rated by experts as one of the most beautiful in the world. I quickly discovered as a student that it was the perfect place to read and study and I went there throughout my four years at the UW.

I moved away for a few years but came back to Seattle. I always was interested in history and eventually started collecting maps and books on the Pacific Northwest. About three years ago I established an endowment in the UW history department to support Pacific Northwest history, and one in Libraries Special Collections for the preservation of books, maps, manuscripts and photos relating to Western Americana. I did this because I cared deeply for the education I received at the UW and for my strong feeling for books, Pacific Northwest History and Suzzallo library.

In 2005, I joined the Friends of the UW Libraries Board of Directors. We work to support the Libraries by making financial contributions, holding our *Literary Voices* fundraising dinner each year and generally trying to increase awareness of all of the good that the Libraries does throughout our region.

A lifelong weather enthusiast and a student of history and literature, Laskin has written a number of nonfiction books about weather, history, American writers, artists, gardens, and travel.

Laskin won the Washington State Book Award for *The Children's Blizzard* in 2005, and for *Partisans: Marriage, Politics and Betrayal Among the New York Intellectuals* in 2001.

Laskin publishes regularly in the *New York Times* Travel Section and in *Preservation Magazine*, and has written for the *Wall Street Journal*, *Smithsonian*, *Horticulture*, *Newsday*, and the *Washington Post*.

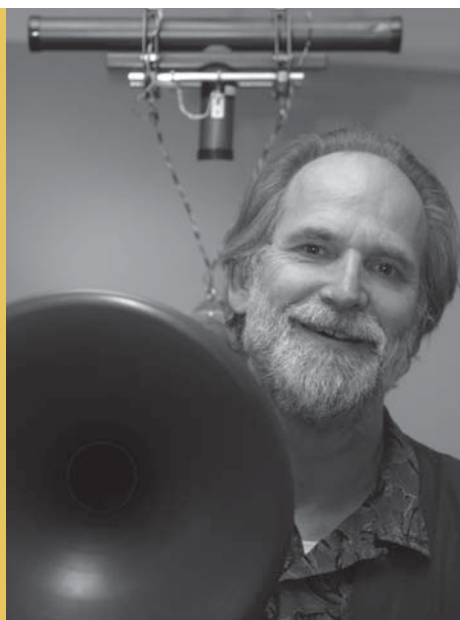

MacArthur Awardee Trimpin to speak at 2007 Artist Images Event October 5, 7 pm

Trimpin is an artist who defies categories. Is he a sculptor? A musician? A mad scientist?

All of the above, agree many who have seen his interactive, computer-driven sound installations which resonate with acoustic sound.

The German-born MacArthur "Genius" Award-winner Trimpin moved to Seattle in 1979, after receiving his Masters in Sozial Padagogik (art and music), from Berlin University.

His recent exhibit, *Pfffft* at the Henry Art Gallery beckoned visitors to interact and drive the sound through their actions and movement in the space.

Trimpin will speak on his process and his exhibits at the 2007 Anne Gould

Hauberg Artist Images Event on October 5, 7pm in Suzzallo 101. The event is co-presented by UW Libraries and UW Alumni Association.

His work has also been shown at the Museum of Glass, Washington State University Museum of Art, Vancouver International Jazz Festival, The Frye Art Museum, Seattle Art Museum, Tacoma Art Museum, and the Missoula Art Museum. His installation of guitars is a permanent exhibit at EMP (Experience Music Project) in Seattle.
